

General Safety Reminders & Rules to Announce

- 1. It is best to stay in teams of at least two for safety for added safety.
- 2. Wear closed-toe shoes at all times, as well as protection from the sun, like a hat & sunscreen. Inspect footwear before dispatching volunteers to work on steep slopes or in the brush.
- 3. Don't pick up syringes, needles, or any hazardous/sharp objects. Mark the spot with a stick or rocks if possible and notify the event leaders. They will place them in appropriate containers.
- 4. If canyon is prone to have rattle snakes warn about staying away if they find them. Tell participants to stomp and make noise before entering an area to avoid surprising a snake and to scare them off.
- 5. Caution volunteers to stay away from any sensitive areas (e.g. nesting areas, wet areas, high quality habitat, restoration areas, etc.). Avoid disturbing plants and animals.
- 6. Warn about locations of cactus, poison oak, laurel sumac (for those with sensitive skin etc.).
- 7. Natural debris (driftwood, shells, fossils etc.) is part of the natural system we are working to restore and should be left alone.
- 8. Don't lift anything too heavy; when in doubt, ask for help!
- 9. Only pick up human-created matter: cigarette butts, plastics, metal, glass, styro-foam, and especially small debris as items such as plastic bottle caps are often what birds and other animals mistake as food.
- 10. Don't touch or pick up dead animals, or attempt to move or treat injured animals. Make your volunteers aware of the animals and where they are.
- 11. Avoid over-exertion, sunburn, heat exhaustion, and dehydration. Drink water. When in doubt, come in early.
- 12. Children should always be supervised by adults and never alone with one adult (except their parent).
- 13. Separate trash from recyclables whenever possible and do not put Household Hazardous Waste, tires, oil, paint, cleansers, or electronic waste, in the trash!
- 14. Walk sideways down steep, gravely, or otherwise slippery slopes. Fall backwards if you slip.
- 15. Point out holes in the trail, pet waste, or other hazard to the hiker behind you.
- 16. Have fun and enjoy your canyon.
